# **Executive Summary**

This report asks the Police and Crime Commissioner to accept the outcome of the tender evaluation process for the provision of Sexual Violence services 2025-28 with the option to extend to 2030.

## Recommendation

The Police and Crime Commissioner is recommended to accept the tender submission from Victim Support to provide the Pan Lancashire All Age Sexual Violence Service.

## 1. Background and Advice

- 1.1 Following notice being given to the current provider of Lancashire Victim Services in January 2024, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner commissioned a full needs assessment of the victim services landscape.
- 1.2 The needs assessment identified some opportunities for improving the sexual violence element of Lancashire Victim Services, this included changes to the delivery model of victim services with creation of a dedicated countywide all age ISVA and sexual violence support service.
- 1.3 Therefore, in designing the new victims' commission, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner put out to market a tender opportunity for the provision of such a service. This opportunity was published on the InTend procurement portal.
- 1.4 The service was specified in accordance the recommended needs to be all age, which broadens the scope of the previous service to meet the needs of victims aged under 5 years old.
- 1.5 The OPCC gave providers a budget envelope of £550,000 per annum, for three years, with the option to extend a further one plus one years. Total funding envelope of £2,750,000 over five years.
- 1.6 The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner received one tender submission, from Victim Support. A panel of multiagency partners, including OPCC, Lancashire Constabulary and NHSE, met to evaluate the submission.
- 1.7 Cost for the service was weighted at 30%. As there was only one submission and the tender same in on budget at £550,000 per annum the full 30% was awarded.
- 1.8 The method statement had 6 quality statements, each with a specific weighting. See below table for scoring.

1.9 The evaluation concluded that the service achieved the critical qualification criteria and scored 87.14% overall.

### 2. Links to the Police and Crime Plan

The provision of a sexual violence service supports the commissioner in meeting his requirements to commission services supporting victims of crime.

It supports the priority to tackle Violence Against Women and Girls which will be one of the priorities in the new Police and Crime Plan.

### 3. Consultations

Representatives from Forbes Solicitors continue to provided legal guidance and integrity assurance on the contracting process.

The Procurement Manager from Lancashire Constabulary was virtually represented on the evaluation panel, and have had oversight of the procurement process.

The evaluation panel was made up of representatives from the OPCC, Lancashire Constabulary and NHS England.

# 4. Implications:

## a. Legal

There will need to be a new contract for the Sexual Violence Service in place for delivery from 1st April 2025.

## b. Financial

The cost of the contract is £550,000 per annum. These costs are covered by the Ministry of Justice grant.

# c. Equality Impact Assessment

The OPCC is currently undertaking an EIA which takes in to consideration all changes made under the recommissioning of Victim Services, no direct equality implications have been identified to date.

### d. Data Protection Impact Assessment

DPIA to be agreed.

## 5 Risk Management

Should contracts not be in place for 1st April the OPCC will not have the provision for victims of sexual violence.
